Reunions are a good source of information for Genealogists. Reunion articles have a list of names of individuals who are somehow related . The article will be written by a relative and not a reporter, so the article will be pretty accurate. The Davenport family reunion is a prime example.

# DAVENPORT FAMILY REUNION SUNDAY Clarksville leaf-Chronicle 13 August 1930

Hamilton Springs near Hampton Station was the scene of the Davenport family reunion Sunday, August tenth.

A delicious basket dinner with barbecue and lemonade was served at noon and swimming was a diversion in the afternoon.

Those present were Mr. and Mrs. J.H. Davenport and family, Mr. and Mrs. R.W. Davenport and family, Mr. and Mrs. Joe Davenport and family, Mr. and Mrs. Robert Davenport and family, Ernest Davenport and son, Thomas, Mrs. J.P. Davenport and family, Mr. and Mrs. J.D. Bowler, Mr. and Mrs. Melvin Price and family, Mr. and Mrs. Emanuel Binkley and family, Mr. and Mrs. Fred Hooper, Mr. and Mrs. B.A. Cushman, Mr. and Mrs. Laurence Butler, and family, Mr. and Mrs. Adams Price and family, Mr. and Mrs. Miller Robison and family Misses Vydellie and Dorothy Shelton, Lillian Flemings, Clara price, Robbie Gilbert, and John Dudley Taylor, Scott Flemings, Richard Compton, Felix Davis, Kermit Smith, Staten Waller, Dr. Young, Percy Randle, A.P. Price and J. Trice and son.

The progenitor of this family can be traced back to King William CO VA. Stephen, son of Thomas Davenport Sr., purchased 200 acres of land on Tearwallet Creek in 1756. He married Mary Slaughter, daughter of Martin and Jane Elliott Slaughter. Stephen's first born son William, married Patsy Martha Wallis. Their son Thomas Henry married Margaret Elizabeth Wallis. She may have been his cousin.

Thomas and Margaret's son Joseph Fird was born in Trigg CO KY, 31 March 1849. Joseph moved to Trenton, Todd CO KY when he married Catherine Jones Butler. Thomas Henry lived there until he died 10 May 1887

Most of the Davenport family remained in Todd CO. Some of the family crossed the border into TN where they resided at Hampton Station, Hampton Station is located off of the Guthrie Hwy. close to the KY border. In 1894 Hampton Station was large enough to have a post office There were many post offices in Montgomery County in 1894: Bellamy, Carmel, Cherry Grove, Clarksville, Corbandale, Cunningham, Dotsonville, Fredonia, Glenellen, Grantville, Hampton Station, Jordan Springs, Louise, Mcallisters Cross Roads, New Providence, Oakwood, Orgains Cross Roads, Palmyra, Peachers Mill, Pleasant Mound, Port Royal, Rattlesnake, Ringgold, Rossview, Sailors Rest, St. Bethlehem, Sango, Shiloh, Southside, Woodford and Woodlawn.

John Henry (**J.H.**), Robert Walker (**R.W.**) and Joseph Ferd (**Joe**) Jr., were brothers. They were the sons of Joseph Ferd and Catherine Jones Butler Davenport. The brothers were all born in Todd CO KY. John Henry and Joseph moved to Montgomery County where they lived until they died. Robert Walker lived in Trenton, Todd CO KY until his death.

Mr. and Mrs. **John Henry (J.H)** Davenport and family were the first attendees listed at the reunion. John. Henry was born 6 Jan 1874 in Todd CO KY and died 17 July 1959 in Montgomery CO. In the 1920 Census he lived on State Line Rd. in Montgomery CO TN.

In 1927 John Henry's address was listed as Guthrie RR #3 on his children's school record. Children Paul, John W, Gene, Stella, Vella, Margaret and Lucie attended Oakland School in Montgomery CO. At one time, students from Guthrie crossed the state line to attend school in Montgomery CO. Kennedy, Harris, Seay, Haley, Smith and Suiter were a few of the families that also attended Oakland School.

In 1930 according to the census record, John Henry lived in District 2 of Montgomery CO, He was listed as a widow. I am not sure about this, because the reunion article said his wife Mrs. Davenport attended the reunion. In the 1930 census, his cousin Tommie Butler a widow, was listed in John's household. John was married two times. He married Louise Hyams 20 Feb. 1892 in Montgomery CO TN. John Henry and Louise had four children: Louis Ervin, Fannie L, Robert and Ella Bell. John Henry married Marie Alice "Hattie" Haley next. They had ten children: James Earnest, Stella H., Paul Kern, Vella, Margaret, John W., Frances, Gene, Lucie and Louise. Marie died 3 October 1924, which would make the census correct. It's possible John married a third time.

Robert Walker (R.W.) and wife Irene Rene Hyams were attendees. Irene was the sister of Louise who was the wife of Robert's brother John Henry. Robert married Irene about 1893 in Montgomery CO. He was born 4 March 1870 in Todd CO KY and died 11 Dec. 1941 in Trenton, Todd CO KY. In the 1900 census the children of Robert's brother John Henry, are listed in Robert's household. In the 1900 census Robert and Irene had a daughter Ada, niece Fanny L, nephew Joe, nephew Robert, and niece Ella in the household. It's possible John Henry's first wife Louise, had died and he needed help to raise his children. In the 1910 census the children were back with their father and his second wife Mary Alice.

Joseph Ferdinand "Joe" and wife Missouri Holland Price Davenport were attendees. Joe was born 27 June 1880 in Todd CO KY and died 24 may 1964 in Montgomery CO. Joe married Missouri 2 Dec. 1897 in Montgomery CO. They had four children: Joe Jr., Ruby Bell, Bessie Catherine, and Charles Fird. In 1927 his address was listed as Clarksville RR #3 on his children's school record. In 1927, children Joe Jr. and Catherine attended school at Oakland School in Montgomery CO. Joe was the brother of John Henry and Robert Walker. (Continued on page 4)

Attendee **Robert William** was the son of John Henry and Louise Hyams Davenport. Robert was born 7 Oct. 1896 in KY. He married Louise Hooper. They had six children: Clarence, Hazel, Rybart, Mildred, Dorothy and John.

Attendee **Fred L. Hooper** was the brother of Louise, wife of Robert Davenport. Fred L. and Louise were the children of Fred C and Ethel L Johnson Hooper.

**Benjamin** (B.A.) Cushman was an attendee. He was married to Elizabeth "Lizzie" Bowler. I have not found their connection to the Davenports. **J.D. Bowler** attendee was possibly Elizabeth's relative.

Joseph "Joe" Ferdinand son of Joseph Ferd Davenport married Catherine Jones Butler. She was the daughter of Nathan and Mary Dukes Butler. It is possible that attendee **Laurence Butler** was Catherine's relative..

James **Ernest** and son Thomas Edward Davenport were attendees. James was the son of John Henry. He was born 27 June 1905 in Todd CO KY. He was married to Minnie Mae Jeffries

**Melvin** and Fannie L Davenport Price were attendees. Fannie was the daughter of John Henry. She was born around May 1892. Fannie and Melvin had three children: J.W., Douglas and Gladys. It is possible that Attendees **Clara Price** and **Adams Price** were Melvin's relatives.

Charles **Emanuel** and wife Ella Bell "Ellie" Davenport Binkley and family were attendees. Ella was the daughter of John Henry. The family of Ella and Emauel included four sons and three daughters: Emauel, Charles O, Ralph, Richard H., Mildred, Billie and Eleanor. Ellie was the daughter of John Henry and Louise Hyams Davenport.

Paul Kern son of John Henry Davenport, married Minnie Robinson. It is possible that attendee **Miller Robinson** is Minnie's relative..

The rest of the attendees play a minor role in the genealogy of the Davenport family. They are probably friends, children or grandchildren. I tried to do research on them, but there is not a lot of information available. It was interesting to try to trace Kermit Smith. I traced the Smith's back to Scott CO TN where I was born. Then I realized it was time to quit that I was getting way off base.

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#### **TOMBSTONES**

Cleo Hogan just completed a 2.5 day seminar/workshop by the National Park Service titled "Nationwide Cemetery Preservation Summit, 2009" in Nashville. He is also a member of the "Association for Gravestone Studies". Cleo offers the following advise:

It continues to be the position of preservationists that marble and slate grave markers should NOT be scrubbed with wire brushes, NOR rubbed with crayon or anything else. It is my opinion that granite markers are not so susceptible to this kind of damage, and could be rubbed.

However, the less damaging method of studying markers is to rub common household flour onto the stone by handfuls, then gently brush it off with the hand or a bristle brush. It brings out the inscription so it can be photographed. Somehow, some folks have the idea that chalk rubbed onto the stone is useful, but flour far exceeds chalk in bringing out the inscription so it can be photographed successfully. Shaving cream canNOT be used, as it contains oils that seep into the pores of the marker from the residue left behind, and causes the surface to "shale" off over timenot the next day, but eventually.

I am of the opinion that marker rubbing with crayon or chalk onto paper creates a medium that is momentarily interesting, but which is discarded shortly thereafter. Photographs of the floured inscription are much smaller, and can be preserved in an album, or a project folder, so I suggest you consider that, rather than the momentarily interesting "rubbing".

Now, where to go: You will need to consult with the sexton of each of these, Greenwood in Clarksville, Riverview in Clarksville, Riverside in Hopkinsville, and Old City in Hopkinsville about whether rubbing is permitted, should you prefer to continue with that plan. The Mt. Olive Cemetery in Clarksville contains hundreds of black burials and some legible stones, if a visit there is desired. There are also two black cemeteries across the street from Greenwood in Clarksville that are adjacent, and appear to be one cemetery, I believe. The Montgomery County Archives can point the directions out for you, if you are not familiar with sites in Clarksville.

I am of the opinion no permission is necessary if only photographing is planned, even if flour is used, since it is organic and washes off with the next rain.

If you wish to clean any stone before studying it, use plain water, or a solution called "D/2", which is a biological cleaner. NEVER use any kind of bleach or household cleaner! Sometimes the lichen or mold is so attached in the crevices of the inscription that cleaning is necessary prior to photographing.

Several sites with photographs are linked to the Montgomery County historical Society webpage, so browse around on there before going into the field.

I hope this is helpful to you.
